History

The Nieuport 24 is a World War I French frontline fighter aircraft designed by Gustave Delage as a development of the successful Nieuport 17. Its small size, relatively light weight and small engine gave it a significant maneuverability advantage in a dog fight. There were 310 Nieuport aircraft in service in French army in 1917-1918.

Some N24s were exported to Russian Empire, and later briefly produced under license in Moscow by company Dux. After the Soviet revolution Dux was nationalized and became ΓΑ3 No 1, and continued production until 1923.

An American aircraft manufacturer Walter Redfern, which specialized in the design and provision of plans for homebuilt aircraft, designed and produced a replica, called Redfern Nieuport 17/24. The plans were available to buy until Walter's death in 1996.
